But beware—this party isn't just about tricks and treats. Behind the cobwebs and cauldrons


lies a greater purpose. This year's fright fest benefits Olive Crest, an organization dedicated to preventing child abuse and strengthening families in crisis.

### Insiring PatriotismThrough the Elks Americanism Essay Contest

Each year, the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks sponsors the Americanism Essay Contest, an opportunity for students to reflect on what it means to be an American and to celebrate the values that unite us. This contest not only strengthens pride in our nation but also gives young people a voice in expressing the ideals of service, citizenship and patriotism.

This year's theme: "What Does Service to Your Country Mean to You?" The theme invites students to think deeply about the many ways Americans can serve their country—whether through military service, volunteerism, community engagement or simply helping neighbors in need.

All students enrolled in grades five through eight at the time of the contest are eligible. Entries are divided into four divisions:

Division 1: 5th GradeDivision II: 6th GradeDivision III: 7th Grade

Essays must not exceed 300 words and must be typed or legibly handwritten in ink and submitted exactly as written by the entrant. Each essay must include

• Division IV: 8th Grade

entrant. Each essay must include the student's name, grade, school and sponsoring Elks lodge. Essays must be turned into the Santa Ana Elks Lodge Americanism chairman, Dr. Pat Machado, by December 15. Entry forms are available in the lodge lobby.

The Americanism essay contest is more than just a writing competition. It's a chance for young people to reflect on the responsibilities of citizenship and the importance of service in shaping the future of our country. It also gives the Elks a way to encourage civic pride and foster a love of country among tomorrow's leaders.

To ensure this year's contest reaches as many students as possible, we are seeking connections with administrators in the Santa Ana Unified School District (grades 5-8). # The Elks and Red Ribbon Week Standing United for Drug Awareness

Every October, schools and communities across America fill their halls and streets with red ribbons. Students wear them proudly, teachers decorate classrooms and entire towns hold rallies to spread a simple but powerful message: say no to drugs. But behind the familiar sight of Red Ribbon Week lies a story of tragedy, resilience and one man's sacrifice that ignited a nationwide movement.

The origins of Red Ribbon Week trace back to 1985 and the story of Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) agent. Camarena, who grew up in Calexico, California, joined the DEA after serving as a firefighter, Marine and police officer. Known for his dedication, he worked tirelessly to dismantle powerful drug cartels in Mexico.

Tragically, on February 7, 1985, Camarena was kidnapped, tortured and killed by cartel members. His brutal death shocked the nation and deeply impacted his hometown. Friends and neighbors, searching for a way to honor his memory, began wearing red ribbons as a symbol of their commitment to a drug-free lifestyle.

What began as a grassroots act of remembrance,
soon grew into something larger. In California, a group of high school
friends and community leaders formed Camareno Clubs,
pledging to lead lives free from
substance abuse in honor of the
fallen agent. Their movement spread
quickly, fueled by the urgency of the

drug crisis in the 1980s.


By 1988, the U.S. Congress and President Ronald Reagan had officially recognized Red Ribbon Week as a national antidrug campaign. It became the largest prevention awareness program in the nation, reaching millions of students across all 50 states.

The red ribbon became a unifying emblem—a visual reminder of the dangers of drug use, but also of courage, sacrifice and community strength. Much like a yellow ribbon tied around a tree for soldiers or a pink ribbon for breast cancer awareness, the red ribbon evolved into a rallying symbol of hope.

One of the strongest partners in spreading Red Ribbon Week across the country has been the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. Since the late 1980s, the Elks have been deeply involved in drug awareness and prevention, making Red Ribbon Week a cornerstone of their community service.

Through their Elks Drug
Awareness Program (DAP)—
the largest volunteer drug
education effort in the
United States— local Elks
lodges provide schools
with red ribbons, host
student contests, sponsor educational events
and work closely with
parents, teachers and law
enforcement. Our motto,
"Elks Care, Elks Share," extends powerfully to our fight
against youth substance abuse.

For many students, the Elk's presence is part of their earliest



memories of Red Ribbon Week—whether through assemblies, poster contests or simply being handed a red ribbon or DAP coloring book by a smiling Elk volunteer. Our participation has helped the campaign remain vibrant, visible and impactful for nearly four decades.

Now observed every year from October 21-31, Red Ribbon Week continues to grow in scope and creativity. Schools host assemblies, student sign drug-free pledges, law enforcement collaborates with educators, and communities stage rallies and awareness campaigns. The Elks remain at the forefront, ensuring that new generations embrace the message. The Elks are committed to eliminating the use and abuse of illegal drugs by all members of society and believe that in order to ensure a bright future for our country, it is essential that our children be raised in a drug-free environment. In Santa Ana, the Elks are holding a Trunk-or-Treat event on Sunday, October 26 from 4:00 to 6:00 pm, inviting children and families from the community to trick or treat in a safe environment and leave, not

just with candy, but with Elks DAP coloring books and other materials.

The National Family Partnership (formerly the National Federation of Parents for Drug Free Youth) which spearheaded the campaign, continues to lead the national effort, while allies like the Elks amplify it at the local level. Each year, a new theme—such as this year's "Drugs are a Grave Mistake"—guides the week and inspires participation nationwide.

While Red Ribbon Week lasts only seven days, its impact continues year-round. For many the red ribbon is a reminder that one person's sacrifice can spark change—and that communities united can shape healthier futures for generations.

Nearly four decades after Agent Camarena's death, the red ribbon still carries his legacy. It stands for courage in the face of danger, determination in the fight against drugs, and the power of communities—families, schools, and organizations like the Elks—to transform grief into hope.

### Trunk-or-Treat to support Red Ribbon Week





- Lifetime income for you and your spouse.
- An immediate income tax deduction.
- Avoidance of capital gains taxes
- Reduced estate taxes
- Tax-sheltered growth
- BLT recognition

It's a way to give back while also securing financial peace of mind.

Community Disposal Box: A second way to dispose of an Amer-

ican flag is to drop it off in a flag disposal box. Flags made of cloth will be respectively burned during a ceremony. All other materials will need to be cut in a specific way. We will collect the disposed flags and handle accordingly. South Coast District also holds an annual ceremony to retire them.






